It All Adds Up —by Roger Paterson

A 6,000-year-old earth? When you look up the Bible references, the math's not that hard!

We've all heard the horror stories. Teachers in government schools force students through strange, torturous machinations to do simple math. For example, many of us used to be able to add 121 + 13 in 1.72 seconds. The Common Core method takes 7 steps and 3 minutes and 18 seconds.

You might think you need to do similar mathematical gymnastics to arrive at the age of the earth, so you leave it to the scientists. Or maybe you just ignore the subject because you don't see how it relates to your everyday struggles to follow Jesus. Well, this is not a salvation issue, but it is an issue of authority. Here is what I mean.

For those who trust in an evolutionary view of history, determining the earth's age is a complicated process. First, you have to find a meteorite, crush it up, and then send it to a lab for analysis. (Why a meteorite? I'll get to that later.) 4,500,000,000 years (or at least that's the expected result). That's a whole lot of zeros!

Technicians measure the ratio of isotopes and enter that into a complex calculation that factors in the rate of radiometric decay. Out pops a number somewhere around 4,500,000,000 years (or at least that's the expected result). That's a whole lot of zeros!

But if you look to the Bible as the ultimate source of truth, a much simpler answer emerges. And you don't even need to find a meteorite. All you need is a Bible and a calculator. In fact, open your Bible to Genesis 5.

While people might joke about reading genealogies as a substitute for counting sheep, they serve a very important purpose as part of God's Word. These lists demonstrate the historical nature of the early chapters of Genesis. Real men had real sons, and we know how old each man was at the birth of his son.

Many refer to this list and the one in Genesis 11 as chronogenealogies since each name in Genesis 5 and 11 contains a time stamp. Seth was born to Adam at 130, and Seth had Enosh when he was 105. So from Adam to Enosh, 235 years passed. Using your calculator (I won't make you do it the Common Core way), you can run down the list and add the ages from Adam to Noah. You should come up with 1,556 years to the birth of Noah's sons (I'll wait for you to check my math). But they were not triplets—Shem was the middle child (Genesis 9:24, 10:21), born when Noah was 502. That brings the date at Shem's birth to 1,558 years after the creation of Adam.

You can pick up Shem's descendants in Genesis 11:10 and continue adding the dates together. You arrive at Terah, accumulating 320 more years. With some careful examination of Genesis 11:32 and 12:4, we know Terah was 130 when Abraham was born. Adding all of this gives us a time span of about 2,008 years from Adam to Abraham.

To be fair, there are some differences in various ancient manuscripts that you should study if you want to understand this issue in detail. But you'll find the dates vary by a few thousand years at the most. Even if, as some Christians propose, there are missing names in these genealogies and Arphaxad, for example, is really Shem's grandson, the timing doesn't change (because the Bible is clear about how old Shem was when Arphaxad was born). So now we know there were about 2,000 years from Adam to Abraham, but how do we get to the present? Think backward from this point. Pop quiz: How many years have passed from Jesus' life to the present? Since our modern calendar gives dates in Anno Domini (the year of our Lord), the answer is easy: about 2,000.

All that's left is to determine the time between Jesus and Abraham. This is a little more complicated, but with a bit of hopping from book to book, it is possible to calculate the answer from the Bible. Bible scholars disagree on a few details but the total disagreement covers only about 200 years. Most historians, even those who don't believe the Bible, agree that Abraham was born around 2000 BC—and this dating agrees with the biblical record.

Now you have the three pieces to add together, but I bet you can do this part in your head. From creation to Abraham is about 2,000 years. Abraham to Jesus covers about 2,000 years, and you are 2,000 years removed from Jesus. 2 + 2 + 2 = 6. That means the earth, and the entire created universe, is about 6,000 years old.

Now that might sound radical if you have always heard the earth is 4.5 billion years old. But on what authority should you accept that claim? Christians should look to God's Word to determine right and wrong, so why shouldn't they do so on matters like the age of the earth? To do otherwise seems inconsistent. If you look to man's interpretation of the natural world and the age of the earth, you place your trust in man over God.

Scientists who believe the universe is billions of years old assume the earth and meteors formed at the same time from a spinning cloud of debris. On top of that, the radiometric dating methods they use to determine meteorites' ages rely on still more assumptions. This chain of assumptions is unreliable and totally disagrees with the Bible. We are talking about thousands versus billions—that's more than a rounding error.

Without these alleged billions of years, evolution cannot happen. Ideas like human evolution are bound up in the question of the age of the earth. You don't need those vast ages if you trust that God created plants, animals, and humans supernaturally—as He says He did in Genesis 1. While this question may not factor into your daily decisions, it has important consequences. To be sure, all who trust in Christ alone for salvation are secure, even if they believe in an old earth. But if you can't trust God's Word on the age of the earth, why should you trust it when it tells you Jesus rose from the dead? The same skeptical scientists who say the earth is 4.5 billion years old would tell you dead men don't rise from the grave days later. So who are you going to trust?



COVID-19 antibody testing finds number of Bay Area infections may be 85 times higher than reported

A team of researchers in California found that the number of coronavirus cases in one California county may actually be up to 85 times higher than what health officials have found, and thus, the virus's true fatality rate may be much lower than previously thought.

Stanford University-led researchers tested 3,330 adults and children in Santa Clara County for COVID-19 antibodies and found that the population prevalence ranged from 2.49% to 4.16%.

The researchers concluded:

"The most important implication of these findings is that the number of infections is much greater than the reported number of cases. Our data imply that, by April 1 (three days prior to the end of our survey) between 48,000 and 81,000 people had been infected in Santa Clara County. The reported number of confirmed positive cases in the county on April 1 was 956, 50-85-fold lower than the number of infectious predicted by this study." "Many estimates of fatality rate use a ratio of deaths to lagged cases (because of duration from case confirmation to death), with an infections-to-cases ratio in the 1-5 fold range as an estimate of under-ascertainment," the researchers wrote. "Our study suggests that adjustments for under-ascertainment may need to be much higher."

The researchers called widespread antibody testing "an important tool for reducing uncertainty about the state of the epidemic":

"While our study was limited to Santa Clara County, it demonstrates the feasibility of seroprevalence surveys of population samples now, and in the future, to inform our understanding of this pandemic's progression, project estimates of community vulnerability, and monitor infection fatality rates in different populations over time. It is also an important tool for reducing uncertainty about the state of the epidemic, which may have important public benefits."

Dr. Scott Gottlieb, former FDA commissioner, agreed that the researchers' findings are likely representative of what overall national exposure looks like:

This probably aligns with what overall national exposure may be, on order of about 5% once we do wide serology. Santa Clara was a hot spot and I would have expected exposure to be higher. Overall we're probably diagnosing 1 in 10 to 1 in 20 infections.

In hot spot cities like New York, there's data to suggest the overall infection rate may be much higher. We're also likely to find higher rates of infection among certain jobs. But the data so far suggest that nationally, total exposure is still low.

The Bay Area was one of the first regions hit by the pandemic and also one of the first to lock down in response to the virus.

Though it appears that the test's results are being trusted by experts, the Premier Biotech serology test, which was used in the Santa Clara County study, has not yet been approved by the FDA.






