Jealousy and Envy Refresher

The 19th century Frenchman, Victor Hugo, is considered one of the greater writers of all time. Best known for Les Miserables and the Hunchback of Notre-Dame, he also wrote a little poem called, L'Avarice et L'Envie. Greed and Envy are two sisters in the poem. One day they are granted one wish; whatever they wanted. But there was one condition: whatever they request, the other sister will receive double of that same thing. Translated into English, the poem concludes:

Envy at last the silence broke,
And smiling, with malignant sneer,
Upon her sister dear,
Who stood in expectation by,
Ever implacable and cruel, spoke
"I would be blinded of one eye!"

Envy: a disturbing and resentful desire which craves advantage over another, or, a disturbing and resentful awareness of someone else's advantage over you. Envy craves to possess the God-given providences in another person's life. Similarly, it craves to be superior to another person in some way. Typically envy has no

problem weeping with those who weep. At times it can rejoice with those who rejoice in response to a blessing in another's life. However, it will not rejoice if that blessing is somehow superior to itself or the object of its own idolatry.

Do you struggle with envy or jealousy? But they are just little sins, right? Just a brief, but minor moment of ignobility?

Diagnosing Jealousy & Envy

Do you sincerely rejoice with others when they experience something that you really want, but you did not receive? Are you happy for others when they are somehow shown as superior to you in some way? Or they receive something you were hoping for but did not get?

At one point in your life, envy might show its ugly head in athletic ability. Later in life, it might be a job promotion. Then its kids and even in the local church ("What?! That person got picked to do that over me? Does anyone know about my credentials and my experience?!").

When a co-worker gets that raise and recognition and you don't, do you rejoice? When that person enters into a relationship situation that you want, do you rejoice? When that brother or sister receives a ministry promotion or recognition that you hoped for, do you rejoice? When a friend's child is more self-controlled, behaved, godly, or recognized than yours, do you rejoice?

If not, you might, like the rest of us, have a little sinful jealousy and envy thriving in your heart.

Love is not jealous (1 Cor. 13:4).

Jealousy and envy need not manifest in an outward rage of violence against another. Instead, they can simmer deep down in the person who seems outwardly content and quiet.

The Root

There is, however, more going on in those moments of jealousy and envy than

jealousy and envy. These two cousins are sickly fruit on a sickly tree controlled by sickly roots. Jealousy and envy are symptoms of a much deeper problem.

The root of jealousy and envy is sinful pride; a deep worship of self. Sinful envy is simply the offspring of self-worship. Envy worships self so much, that it is disturbed inside when someone else experiences something better than self.

Envy thinks, if inadvertently, "I am so wonderful and worthy of worship, that I deserve advantage over that person in some way." Sinful jealousy preaches to itself, "I am so exalted and worthy of praise, that it is a violation of all that is good, right, and just for so-and-so to experience more blessed circumstances than me in this or that area." Envy is the ante-Psalm 115:1 "Not to anyone else, O Lord, not to anyone else, but to me alone be glory." Envy can even subtly meditate, "I am OK if that person experiences blessing, but it better not be more blessing than me. And it better not be more blessing than in this particular thing." For those reasons, jealousy and envy are really a deep and wretched idolatry, and the worst possible kind of idolatry; the worship of self. Gilbert Chesterton once said, "Let Jones worship the sun or moon, anything rather than the Inner Light; let Jones worship cats or crocodiles, if he can find any in his street, but not the god within."

What does God think of jealousy and envy?

But if you have bitter jealousy and selfish ambition in your heart, do not be arrogant and so lie against the truth. 15 This wisdom is not that which comes down from above, but is earthly, natural, demonic. 16 For where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there is disorder and every evil thing (Jas. 3:14–16).

First, God says that jealousy is arrogant. Self-worship is the highest kind of arrogance. Second, it is a lie against the truth. It is not thinking truthfully about God, self, and others. Third, it is demonic. Some associate "demonic" with things like a type of music, for example. God teaches that jealousy and envy are demonic. Why? Because at the heart of our jealousy is the very sin of Satan, the leader of the demons: "I must be number one, even if it means the downfall and misfortune of someone close to me." Fourth, jealousy and envy are in association with disorder and every evil thing. So, these are no small sins.

The Many Sins of Jealousy & Envy

In our moments of jealousy and envy, there are a few things happening.

First, we are holding onto a thing too tight. We greatly desire something; maybe even something good. But envy surfaces in our hearts concerning the thing, it has become an idol and object of worship. So, we have violated the greatest commandment (Exod. 20:4-5; Matt. 22:37). Therefore, we must come to the cross of Christ, not just for envy, but worshiping something above God.

Second, in envy and jealousy, we see ourselves as so great and glorious, that we deserve advantage and blessing more than others. Thus, as mentioned, we are in the darkness of self-worship. This too is idolatry and a great sin (Exod. 20:4-5; Matt. 22:37). We must come to the cross of Christ, not just for jealousy, but for venerating ourselves as a god.

Third, we love ourselves and want glory so badly that we will hate others in our heart, even a sister or brother in Christ. [We] may not be saying to ourselves, "I hate so-and-so!" But, are we considering them more important than ourselves (Phil. 2:3-4)? Are we loving them as much as we love ourselves (Matt. 22:39)? Thus, we must come to the cross of Christ, not just for envy, but for hating our neighbor.

Fourth, in jealousy and envy, we are failing to trust God's providence in our lives. God is the one who is sovereign over who gets what (Ps. 103:19, 135:6). We are spurning his providence in the lives of others. We are, in effect, saying, "God, sorry, but you do not know what you are doing in the universe by allowing so-and-so to experience greater blessing than me in this area. You need me to run the universe instead." We are not trusting in God's sovereignty; that whatever we have or don't have, it is all God. God is the one who gives. Thus, we must come to the cross of Christ, not just for jealousy, but for snubbing God and his doings.

Repenting of Jealousy & Envy

There are a few things we can do to address the wretchedness of jealousy and envy.

First, we must confess the multi-faceted sins for what they are (e.g. idolatry, hate,

spurning God).

Second, we can remind ourselves afresh that God is sovereign over all things. He is far more wise, loving, and capable than us when it comes to running the universe. We can trust him when it comes to his providence in people's lives. It is God who gives.

Third, we must remind ourselves of what we actually deserve. What would be fair recompense for a sinner who has failed to love God, praise God, worship God, trust God, fear God, honor God, and obey God as much as he deserves countless times in thought, word, and deed? What would be just? Eternal punishment (Rev. 20:11-15).

Fourth, we must remind ourselves of the goodness of God in light of what we deserve. In his common grace, he gives rain, sun, laughter, food, family, jobs, air, and far more to his enemies (Matt. 5:45).

Fifth, we must remind ourselves that our job is to love others (Matt. 22:39). True humble love shows when we really want something, we don't get it, someone else does, and we thank God, trust God, and sincerely celebrate with and for that person.

Sixth, we must remind ourselves that our calling from God as it relates to others is not to envy them, but serve them (Mark 10:42-45). Greatness is servanthood. We are to outdo one another in blessing each other (Rom. 12:10). Jealousy and envy focus on the opposite.

Seventh, we must remind ourselves of God's colossal grace in the Person and finished work of Jesus Christ.

The Lord Jesus was the only person who never sinned in envy and jealousy. He always did what was pleasing to God the Father (John 8:29). But there were plenty of occasions where he could have been tempted due to another's advantage over him (Heb. 4:15). He is truly God. The blessed Lord Jesus is the King far superior to every king and the Lord far exalted above every lord. He created the stars, the galaxies, the universe, and everything there in by speaking. He is omniscient, knowing all that there is to know about everything instantaneously. Jesus is God.

And yet, how did he fair in this wretched world?

People approached him as if he was some kind of wacko who should be shut up forever. Most saw themselves as superior to him. He was thought to be a demon-possessed outcast (John 8:48). He was thought to be the most shameful type of reject possible, only worthy of a humiliating death. Jesus knew that most thought this of him. So many experienced temporal advantages over him during his time on Earth. And yet, he never sinned once for even a second in jealousy or envy of others.

In fact,

[A]lthough He existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself, taking the form of a bond-servant, and being made in the likeness of men. Being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross (Phil. 2:6-8).

Jesus went to the cross to pay the full penalty for sinful envy and jealousy in the place of all who would ever repent and bow the knee to him. As our righteous substitute, Jesus bore the undiluted wrath of God in the place of the envy, jealous, self-worshipers. He then rose bodily to new life, so that all who put faith in him might experience salvation and sanctification out of all sin, including jealousy and envy.



County supervisor says San Diego has only had 6 "pure, solely coronavirus deaths" out of 194 listed as such

San Diego County in California has officially listed 194 deaths due to the novel coronavirus, but only six of those fatalities were the result of the virus alone, according to County Supervisor Jim Desmond. All other deaths were also due in part to previous, underlying health concerns.

"We've unfortunately had six pure, solely coronavirus deaths — six out of 3.3 million people," Desmond said during an interview with Armstrong & Getty Extra Large Interviews podcast . "I mean, what number are we trying to get to with those odds. I mean, it's incredible. We want to be safe, and we can do it, but unfortunately, it's more about control than getting the economy going again and keeping people safe."

Asked about Desmond's characterization of the situation, Public Health Officer Dr. Wilma Wooten cautioned it was important not to downplay the loss of life for those with underlying conditions, remarking "their life is no less valuable."

Desmond has been an outspoken critic of California's response to the pandemic, suggesting that leaders are "holding our jobs and the economy hostage." He contends that it is possible to keep people safe and still "responsibly open our businesses."






